Anne Frank's diary is one of the most moving documents from the time of the Holocaust and provides an insight into the lives of those in hiding. Anne Frank writes about her helper Miep Gies: "Miep drags herself along like a packhorse. Almost every day she finds vegetables somewhere and brings them back in large shopping bags on her bike. She is also the one who brings five books from the library every Saturday. We always wait eagerly, like little children for a present."
