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Few topics are as taboo as the mental illness of one's own child. Yet mental illnesses among adolescents have increased dramatically: ADHD, depression, smart-phone addiction, obsessive-compulsive disorders. Much is said about young people, but rarely with them. Over a year and a half, Bartholomäus accompanied 25 of them, who allowed her deep insights into their inner worlds. She conducted intensive interviews with doctors, therapists, and parents. The result is a multifaceted portrait of individuals who share how they overcame their crises and what made them strong.

Ulrike Bartholomäus, born in 1965, works as a science journalist for various media. Her bestseller **Why Reach for the Stars When You Can Just Chill** ("Wozu nach den Sternen greifen, wenn man auch chillen kann") was published by Berlin Verlag. She is the mother of a daughter and lives in Berlin.

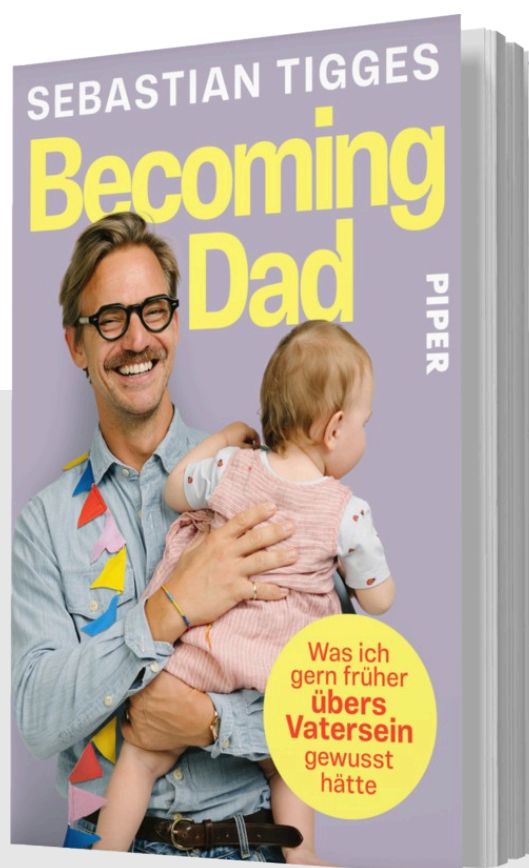

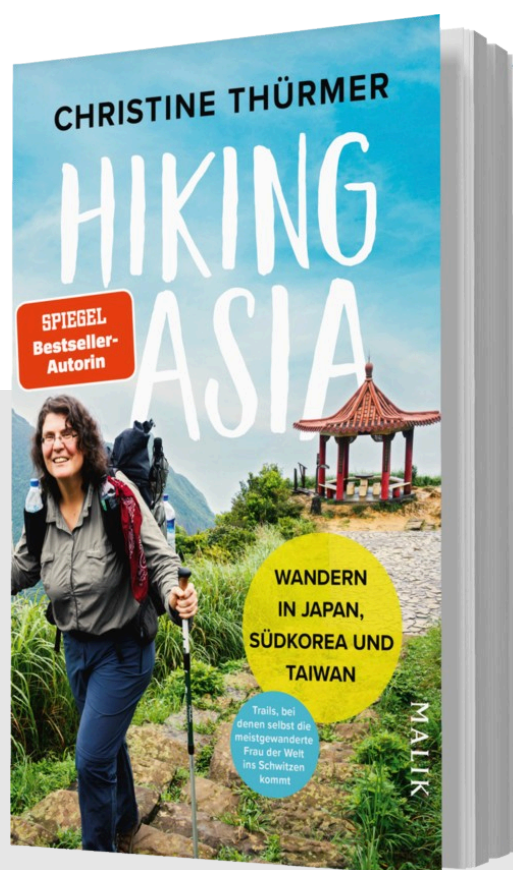
